## PATROL OPERATIONS DIVISION

Patrol Operations is comprised of 16 sworn officers under the leadership of a Major. Officers are assigned to one of four squads, each led by a Sergeant, working 12-hour shifts. Patrol Operations handles all dispatched calls for service, conducts self-initiated enforcement activities and provides high visibility patrols in hopes to prevent and deter criminal activity.

### **STAR Corridor Update**

Officers handled **14** calls for service in this area; completed **119** park, walk and talk activities as well as **44** hours of traffic enforcement and general observation time. Officers had **181** community contacts and conducted **4** roll call meetings.

### **Patrol Highlights**

On April 14, officers conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in the area of Ashcake & Dow Gil Rd. The driver was found to be wanted for an Abduction.

On April 15, officers responded to S. Center St. & W. Francis St. for reckless driver. The vehicle was located and arrested for DUI, Refusal, Driving Revoked DUI-related.

On April 19, an officer responded to the 300 block of Arlington St. for an assault. Upon arrival and subsequent investigation, a suspect was arrested for Burglary, Abduction & Domestic Assault.

On April 20, an officer conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle in the 10200 block of E. Patrick Henry Rd. An occupant of the vehicle was arrested for Possession of Marijuana.

On April 21, an officer observed a suspicious vehicle stop in the 100 block of S. James St. After investigating, the driver was arrested for Possession of Marijuana and Driving on a Suspended License.

On April 29, officers responded to East Omni Court for disorderly subjects. Through the investigation officers were able to obtain warrants for Strangulation, Assault, Domestic Assault, Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle, and Obstruction of a 911 call.

Under the command of Special Operations Division, the **Investigative Unit** is comprised of three investigators led by Lt James Shelhorse. This operational component is responsible for the investigation of all felony and serious/repeat misdemeanor offenses reported to the police department. Additionally, this unit is tasked with proactive investigations into narcotics trafficking and other criminal behavior.

### **Investigative Highlights**

Investigators participated in the Nation-wide Drug Take-Back event and collected 339 lbs. of prescription medications.

Investigators located and apprehended the subject of a narcotics distribution case who was indicted on four counts of distributing Cocaine.

Investigators assisted the HCSO with a threats case The suspect was located by Ashland investigators and pursuant to the investigation, no charges were filed.

Investigators worked on an embezzlement case from a local business. Multiple interviews have been conducted and five search warrants for records have been written.

Investigators received a breaking & entering case with a stolen vehicle at a local business in town. The vehicle was located in NC and the suspect was apprehended and arrested for similar charges in NC.

Investigators conducted CPR training for Town employees and attended Hazmat training.

Investigators conducted one polygraph exam for APD and one for CCSO. Also forensically processed a vehicle for CCSO upon their request which was utilized in an armed robbery.

Under the command of the Special Operations Division, the **Crime Prevention/Logistics Unit** entails several functional components of the agency: Crime Prevention (1 officer), and the Auxiliary Unit (3 volunteer officers) and civilian volunteers all led by Sgt. In addition to duties tasked to individual members, this component is responsible for Recruitment, Selection, Training, Public Information, Special Event Coordination, and IT Administration.
